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## BULLETIN:

- **Global:** 18th INFOFISH World Tuna Trade Conference & Exhibition

## FROZEN FISH:

- Total frozen tilapia imports during Q1 2024 has increased. US remains the top importer despite the decline in import volume, while China continues to dominate the market supply.

## CHILLED AND FROZEN TUNA:

- In Japan, imports of frozen tuna increased during the first quarter of 2024 but declined for air-flown fresh tuna. Consumer demand for *sashimi* tuna weakened in June and continued to be so till July due to the hot and rainy summer months. Imports of non-canned tuna remained flat in the USA.

## SHRIMP:

- International trade for shrimp remains weak during January-June even at low prices. Imports in China and USA were flat during the first half of 2024 and increased marginally in the EU27. Shrimp farmers may opt for low production during the second half of the year.

## CANNED FISH:

- Global exports of canned and processed tuna recovered during the first quarter of 2024. Exports from the top five producers increased during this period. The top exporters were Thailand, Ecuador, China, Spain, and the Philippines.

**Global 18<sup>TH</sup> INFOFISH WORLD TUNA TRADE CONFERENCE & EXHIBITION**

TUNA 2024, held under the theme ‘Advancing Blue Transformation, Sustainability and Innovation through the Global Tuna Industry’ was convened from 20-22 May 2024 at the Shangri-La Hotel in Bangkok, Thailand. There were over 300 delegates in attendance from over 40 countries and a total of 41 booths representing 36 companies and organisations. The conference was chaired by Ms. Rhea Moss-Christian, Executive Director of the Western and Central Pacific Fisheries Commission (WCPFC), with Dr Chanintr Chalissarapong, President of the Thai Tuna Industry Association (TTIA), as the co-Chair. The co-organizers of the event included the Thailand Department of Fisheries, and Thai Tuna Industry Association (TTIA); the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations; RFMOs (WCPFC, IATTC, IOTC); ANFACO; Atuna.com; and the TUNA 2024 media partner, Undercurrent News.

The conference included seven sessions of talks and discussions: 1. An overview of Blue Transformation, sustainability & innovation in the tuna industry; 2. Global tuna industry effort and actions towards sustainability and innovation and sub- sessions, 2.1. Tuna industry efforts and actions towards a resilient and sustainable industry; 2.2. Strengthening industry commitments, partnerships, and innovation towards sustainability; 3. Blue Transformation and Sustainable Supply Chains; 4. The global tuna market and improving production, market promotion, access, trade and investment, innovation and sustainable Tuna Industry growth and sub-sessions, 4.1. Global tuna market trends from across major regional markets; 4.2 Improving production, market promotion, access, trade & investment, innovation, and sustainable tuna industry growth; 5. Advancing global food security and livelihoods for healthier communities; 6. Blue Transformation, innovation, research, science and technology and sub-sessions, 6.1. Innovation and food safety; 6.2. Smart and innovative fishing technology; and 7. Blue Transformation and the future of certification, social accountability, and sustainability in contributing to a safer, clear, and responsible global tuna industry and planet.

The 2nd High-Level Ministerial and Industry Roundtable on Sustainable Tuna Fisheries was held also on 22 May on the sidelines of the conference. The two key themes discussed were (i) cooperation and partnership; and (ii) fair access to major markets. A Joint Communiqué was issued as an outcome of this Ministerial and Industry Roundtable.

**China E-COMMERCE, DINING CHAINS EXPANSION PUSH DEMAND FOR LOW-PRICED WHITEFISH UP**

Local processors of whitefish and exporters of pangasius and other low-cost whitefish globally are taking advantage on the increased demand for the products in China following casual dining chains and e-commerce services expand both domestically and abroad. With the rise of Chinese mass-market seafood restaurant chains, serving lower-priced dishes have become increasingly popular as softer economic growth driving consumer demand for lower-end whitefish species. In addition, the country’s e-commerce channels have also facilitated demand for firms processing lower-priced seafood species. Following huge user numbers and low-priced products, Chinese e-commerce like *Alibaba* and *Temu* are able to expand into other Asian markets.

Below is the table showing China’s total frozen catfish exports during the first quarter of the year. Total exports of frozen catfish increased by 37.5% and 181% compared to four years ago and in 2023 respectively.

**Bangladesh SECOND IN GLOBAL FRESHWATER FISH PRODUCTION**

Based on FAO report “The State of World Fisheries and Aquaculture 2024”, Bangladesh is second in the freshwater fish production globally, next to India. From the previous year, 2022, the country climbed one position up from the third rank surpassing China in 2023. According to the Bangladesh Fisheries Research Institute (BFRI), the country has a total of 4.8 million MT fish production in 2023, with 3.2 million MT from aquaculture, 1.3 million MT caught from freshwater, and the rest are sea-caught. Bangladesh’ freshwater fish production occupies 11.7% of world’s total fish production in 2023 compared to 11% in 2022. It is noted that half of the fish caught from the open waters is hilsa which has a total 0.650 million MT production in 2023.

### **Fresh/Chilled Tilapia Fillet**

During the first quarter of 2024, fresh/chilled tilapia fillet imports in the United States of America decreased by 14.8% at 6 405 MT compared to the same period in 2023. Despite a drop in the import volume, USA continues to be the top importer with 79% market share. Among the other leading importers in ranking were, Canada, Guatemala, Hong Kong, Qatar, and Colombia. Notable increases in imports have been recorded in Guatemala (207%), Hong Kong (192%), and Qatar (97%). The other markets in Asia were Singapore and Japan that reported nominal imports (2 MT each).

In terms of supply, during January – March 2024, Colombia, Brazil, Costa Rica, and Honduras were the top exporters. Honduras recorded a huge decrease in export volume by 70%.

**USA** Meanwhile, the country's imports of fresh/chilled tilapia fillets during the first quarter in 2024 has declined by 20% at 5 071 MT compared to the same period in 2023. In the 4-year review period, a huge decrease is seen in 2024 in comparison with the same period in 2022 and 2023. Fresh/chilled tilapia fillets sales in the US declined largely due to higher price in comparison with cheaper frozen fillets. Among the major suppliers, only Colombia and Brazil recorded increases, while significant decreases were seen in Costa Rica (-23%), Honduras (-72%), and Mexico (-88%).

### Frozen Tilapia

During the January – March 2024 period, global imports of frozen tilapia increased by 11.4% at 103 255 MT compared to the same period in 2023. Both frozen fillet and whole tilapia products recorded increases by 3.4% and 24.8% respectively. Major market destinations for frozen fillet tilapia were Mexico, US, Costa Rica, and Colombia while for frozen whole are Cote d'Ivoire, USA, Mexico, South Africa, and Saudi Arabia.

For frozen tilapia fillet imports, Mexico with a 43% market share surpassed the US as the top market at 25 964 MT imports which was 27.9% higher than the same period a year ago, while imports in the USA decreased by 12.8%. For the whole frozen tilapia category, Cote d'Ivoire dominated the market with a 33.4% share followed by the USA and Mexico. In Asia, Malaysia was the largest importer for whole frozen tilapia and fillets with a 33% rise in imports year-on-year. The other importers in Asia were Thailand, Singapore, Japan, and Korea (Republic of).

Meanwhile, the top suppliers for the first quarter of 2024 were China, Indonesia, and the Netherlands for frozen tilapia fillets, while for the whole frozen fish was China, Taiwan, and India. China continues to dominate the supplies of whole frozen tilapia and frozen fillets; exports of whole fish increased during this period but declined for frozen fillets.

In **China**, demand for tilapia has increased in months due to reduced consumer disposable income. Following expansion of casual dining chains and e-commerce offering lower-priced products, low-cost whitefish like tilapia become increasingly popular. However, Vietnamese *pangasius* are more preferred because of lower price than tilapia challenging domestic producers of tilapia and forcing them to reduce prices despite the rising costs of fish feed.

The **US** remains the top importer of total frozen tilapia when combined (fillet and whole product categories) despite declines in the import volume. During the first quarter of 2024, total frozen tilapia imports decreased by 5.4% at 34 151 MT compared to the same period the previous year. Imports of frozen tilapia fillet comprising 64.8% share in total frozen tilapia imports, declined by 12.8%, while frozen whole tilapia imports increased by 12.4%. Decreases in imports are due to lessened supply by China specifically for frozen fillet in its efforts to reduce its dependency on the export market by selling more fish in its domestic market.

**Sashimi and non-canned tuna trade**

**Japan**

With the beginning of the summer season in June, overall demand and supply of fresh and frozen tuna in Japan's *sashimi* trade reduced significantly along with weakening in prices. The temperature of seawater has also increased affecting quality of domestic tuna on landings. Meanwhile, the overall price rise of household items including seafood since April continue to impact households' disposable income for food including tuna across the country.

During the first quarter 2024, imports of all types of frozen tuna including fillets increased in Japan but declined for the air-flown fresh tuna as demand for locally caught fish increased in the market. This rise in imports could also be linked with improved seasonal demand during the Cherry blossom and Golden Week celebrations in April and May in comparison with the last three years.

There was a significant rise in imports of the popular ultra-frozen tuna fillets during the first quarter of 2024, while imports of whole frozen dressed also increased significantly. The 45% rise in tuna fillet imports comprised of 8 136 MT bluefin, 3 832 MT of yellowfin and 4 512 MT of bigeye for which the main exporters were Malta, China, Korea RP, Spain, Morocco, and Indonesia.

**USA**

Overall import trend for fresh and frozen tuna in the United States of America, the second largest non-canned tuna market, remained flat during January-March 2023 and in 2024. Supplies continued to be dominated with frozen tuna fillet/steaks at 45% in total imports.

**Raw materials for canning and other uses**

**Western Pacific**

According to the FAO-Globefish report, tuna catches in the Western and Central Pacific (WCP) have been inconsistent since late May; some vessels reporting moderate catches while others are reporting poor fishing. Meanwhile, the delivery price of frozen skipjack from the WCP to Thailand increased by US\$100/MT to US\$1,400-1,450/MT in June in comparison with May 2024.

**Southeast Asia and Europe**

Demand for frozen raw material has increased in Thailand. Year-on-year imports during January-April 2024 was 12.2% higher at 266 530 MT and 25% more for cooked frozen loins at 16 600 MT; China and Indonesia were the main suppliers of cooked loins to Thai canners. In Europe, imports of whole frozen skipjack, yellowfin and cooked frozen loins also increased during the first quarter of 2024.

**Japan**

At the Yaizu port in Japan, landings of frozen skipjack and yellowfin are stable, with slight weakening in ex-vessel prices.

**Global supply**

From China to India, farmed shrimp prices reached the record low levels during the first half of 2024, while shrimp imports in the top two markets (China and the USA) during January-April 2024 declined year-on-year.

Nearly 95% shrimp farmers in India’s Gujarat state, the second largest area for shrimp aquaculture in the country, have opted to produce black tiger shrimp in 2024 because of better business returns. This is thus anticipated to reduce overall production of *vannamei* in India in 2024.

Despite the weakening in ex-farmed prices, Vietnam continues to increase production in 2024, which is reflected in the increased exports during the first quarter of 2024. Imports of frozen raw materials for this year, from Ecuador and India were lower than last year’s first quarter suggesting recovery in domestic production of farmed shrimp in 2024.

Farmed shrimp supply in Bangladesh will be low this year, as most the aquaculture farms in the southern region were destroyed and washed away by the strong cyclone in June; black tiger shrimp is the main species farmed in Bangladesh.

Ecuador continues its high production strategy of farmed shrimp despite the low ex-farm and export prices.

**Exports**

According to the revised export data on the first quarter of 2024, shrimp exports declined from Ecuador (-7.2% at 276 760 MT) and Indonesia (-9.4% at 51 155 MT) but increased from India (+4.1 % at 155 624 MT), Vietnam (+26.35 at 61 470MT) and China (+4.3% at 34 710 MT) in comparison with the same period in 2023. Exports from Indonesia declined by 19% at 51 153 MT during this period. Cumulative exports from Ecuador during January-April 2024 were 1% lower year-on-year at 388 562 MT.

**Global import trends in January-April 2024**

**China**

The world’s leading importer of shrimp posted a 5.8% decline in shrimp imports during January-April 2024 with waning monthly supplies of foreign shrimp from February to April 2024 against the same periods a year ago.

However, by April, the market went back to the negative growth trend as cumulative imports fell by 2% at 233 693 MT. Market analysts relate this negative trend to the initial assessments of the Countervailing Duty (CVD) on certain exporting countries.

In Canada, the positive import trends of January-March 2024 continued in April as monthly imports increased significantly by 39% at 5 066 MT making cumulative total reaching nearly 20 000 MT during January-April 2024.

**European Union:**

The 3.5% rise in the European Union shrimp imports during January-March could be credited to increased supplies of farmed shrimp from Ecuador, Vietnam and China and the sea-caught shrimp from Argentina.

Preliminary data in April, also indicated higher imports in Spain, France, and Germany.

**Asia/Pacific**

Japan and Korea Republic are the two non-producing countries in the Asia Far East, imported more shrimp during January-April 2024. In comparison with 2023, shrimp imports in Japan increased by 4.7% at 62 644 MT and 33 000 MT in the Korea (Republic of) associated with the Lunar New Year and Spring festival celebrations during February-May.

Meanwhile, most of the shrimp producing countries in Southeast Asia and Far East enjoy good demand for fresh shrimp in their domestic markets, where demand for medium to small sizes farmed shrimp remains stable almost round the year at retail and catering trade.

**OUTLOOK** The half-yearly production cycle of farmed shrimp will continue in Asia till June/July harvests; there after farmers may use conservative approach in pond seeding and lower harvests if the low-price trend in the trade continues. The 2024 production of farmed *vannamei* in Asia is unlikely to reach the 2024 target as the rising production costs are not compensated by the markets during the first half of the year.

Meanwhile, shrimp imports in China from Ecuador is likely to increase following the free trade agreement (FTA) between these two countries; the FTA is in force from 1<sup>st</sup> May 2024. In China the rise of greenhouse aquaculture may replace imported shrimp to some extent.

In the USA, the revised low Countervailing Duty (CVD) on Ecuadorean shrimp will also induce more supplies from Ecuador to the US market. Other exporting countries affected by the US CVD are gearing up in market diversification to untapped markets. While Hong Kong and Macao receive more supplies from China, markets in Taiwan, Singapore, Malaysia, and countries in the Middle East import regularly from neighboring producers of farmed shrimp.

**Global** In 2023, global imports of frozen squid and cuttlefish increased marginally by 2.6% at 1.7 million MT against the previous year. Among the major market destinations, China, and Korea (Republic of) posted increases in imports by 32.5% and 12.9% respectively, while imports declined in Spain (-3.7%), Thailand (-2.4%) and Italy (-2.4%). Suppliers to China, which continues to be the top market in a 4-year review period are Peru, Indonesia, USA, Malaysia, and India. Peru had a huge increase in exports (+688.8%) to China surpassing Indonesia on the top spot. However, according to *Globefish Highlights 1/2024* the domestic consumption of squid in China did not improve which created problems for traders who were left with high inventories. Meanwhile, Spain in the second spot among the top importers procured supplies from Falkland Islands, Peru, Morocco, India, and China. In Asia, Japan, Vietnam, Malaysia, Taiwan, and the Philippines were also good markets of frozen squid and cuttlefish, where part of these imports are meant for export processing.

**Peru** According to The Marine Ingredients Organization (IFFO), the Total Allowable Catch (TAC) of anchovies in Peru is highly important to the global seafood industry as the country is responsible for about 20% of the global fishmeal production in an average year. For Peru’s first anchovy fishing season, it has been reported that it has already reached its 82% TAC, exceeding 2 million MT in just over 40 days. With the TAC registering at 2.48 million MT, it is significantly higher than the North Central zone’s two seasons in 2023. Given the TAC nearly reached its limit, the fishing industry is now preparing for slow production.

**WORLD Processed and Canned Tuna**

For the first time in four years, global exports of canned and processed tuna (HS 160414) recovered during the first quarter of 2024 in comparison with the same period a year ago. Exports of this product group from the top five producers/suppliers namely Thailand, Ecuador, China, Spain, and the Philippines increased year-on-year during January-March.

Thailand and Spain generally export ready-to-eat or end products, whereas supplies from Ecuador, China, the Philippines consist of semi-processed cooked frozen loins and end products to the export trade. With a 16.5% increase in exports, Thailand, the top supplier had an estimated share of 35% in global exports of canned and processed tuna during the review period.

Exports from Ecuador were 26.6% higher against last year's as supplies of semi-processed cooked loins and canned tuna increased to Europe (EU, UK, Russian Federation) and Latin American markets (Colombia, Chile, Uruguay, Peru, and others) during this period.

For China, Thailand was the top market (31% in total exports, mostly cooked frozen tuna loins and semi-processed loins). Exports to Mexico, Ecuador, and Vietnam also increased.

For Spain, the gains in the inter- EU trade were positive but small.

With over 50% increase in exports (mostly cooked loins) Thailand was the number one export market for Indonesia during the first quarter of this year. Exports of end products (canned tuna), however, declined to Saudi Arabia, Japan, the USA with a 1% decline in total exports year-on year.
